
"My outstanding administrative, clinical technician, nursing, operating room and

# September is #HealthyAgingMonth

According to the American Academy of Ophthalmology, one in six Americans age 65 and older has a vision impairment that cannot be corrected with glasses or contact



lenses, The risk of eye disease increases with age, so regular eye exams become even more important for preserving sight.

Even people who see well and do not have age-related eye diseases may have vision changes that might not be obvious. For instance, it may become harder to distinguish an object from its background when they are the same color (like a white coffee cup sitting on a white table). This is called loss of "contrast

sensitivity."

For others, the ability to see well in different lighting may change. When going from a well-lit area to one with poor light (or the other way around), your eyes may take longer to adapt and focus, or they do not adjust very well.

Problems adjusting to light and dark can make driving more difficult, especially at night or in the rain. Driving can be even more challenging when eye diseases affect your peripheral (side) vision or increase your sensitivity to glare.

For aging drivers, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration recommends the following safety measures:

- Take a driving course designed specifically for seniors
- Drive during daylight hours
- Reduce speed
- Be extra-cautious at intersections
- Keep your windshield clean inside and out and make sure your eyeglasses are not scratched or dirty.



It is essential to have a complete eye exam with your eye doctor every year or two after age 65.

Keeping up with regular eye exams allows your eye doctor to discover problems early. The sooner a problem is detected, the more likely treatment will be successful.

During regular eye exams, your eye doctor will check for age-related eye diseases, including:

- age related macular degeneration
- <u>diabetic retinopathy</u>
- glaucoma
- cataracts

The AAO recommends adults age 65 and older see their eye doctor for a complete eye exam every year or every other year. Early detection of eye conditions and treatment as needed is vital to preserving your vision.

Do I need to wear a mask at my appointment?

All OCB practices require all staff and patients to wear masks and maintain a physical distance. Did you know you can request an appointment through your Mass General Brigham Patient Gateway account?

If you are already a patient with us, you can easily request an appointment through <u>Patient Gateway!</u>

Here's what to do:

- 1. Once you have logged on to the <u>Patient Gateway</u> site, select the "Visits" tab.
- 2. Here you will find a "schedule your appointment" tab.
- 3. That will bring you to a list of your doctors.
- 4. Here you can request an appointment. Select your OCB eye doctor to request a convenient appointment date and time.

If you do not yet have a <u>Patient Gateway</u> account, we recommend setting one up. Through the secure portal you can not only request appointments, but you can message your doctor directly, view test results and pay your medical bills online! Just go to <u>Patient Gateway</u> and follow the steps to create an account.

If you are a new patient, you could also request your first visit through the **website**.
